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loss control survey performed by an insurance company is more than a simple walk-through of your facility. It involves a comprehensive inspection of your operation and a subjective evaluation of your commitment to controlling potential

What You Need to Know About Loss Control Surveys

losses. In short, the loss control survey plays a critical role in the insurance carrier's decision on whether to insure your business and how much they will charge for the coverage if they do.

The purpose of a loss control survey is to identify potential loss exposures (risk) and to determine what measures are in place to control them. When a loss control representative identifies a deficiency in control measures, he/she will make a recommendation for corrective action. The loss control representative does not expect to find perfection. His/her motive is to determine if the deficiencies can be corrected and to gauge the likelihood that management will take the necessary steps to correct them.

The following are the things a loss control representative will look for to determine the level of your commitment to safety in the workplace.

- A written safety program or written safety policies and rules
- Accident investigations conducted immediately following incidents and corrective actions taken to prevent recurrences
- Good employee relations and a low turnover rate
- Sound hiring practices
- Aggressive provisions for light or modified duty of injured workers
- Safety training for all new hires
- Regular safety training sessions for all employees
- Compliance with current OSHA standards, fire codes, EPA regulations, and DOT regulations
- Well maintained premises and equipment
- Good housekeeping and storage practices
- Methods to control fire hazards, including fire exits, alarms and emergency lighting
- Good loss history (low loss frequency and no large losses)
- Good control over physical hazards (machines guarded, hearing protection provided, and floors in good condition)

By making these your goals and putting forth the effort required to attain them, you can ensure that your loss control survey will go smoothly.

Claims Management

The Claims Management section of the web site provides information about KARE's exemplary claims management program, as well as instructions for reporting a claim. Another particularly useful feature found in this section is easy access to the managed care network of occupationally oriented physicians made available to KARE policyholders by Bluegrass Health Network (BHN). Simply go to the Claims Management page in the Policyholder section and click on "Find a Provider" to search the BHN provider database and quickly find a physician or hospital in your area. According to Sue Barber, BHN Manager, "Printed directories are generally out of date the day they are published. An electronic, webbased directory, however, is much easier to manage and more reliable because it can be updated on a more frequent basis."
